Through rigorous academics grounded in the perennial classical curriculum and a commitment to personal attention of each student and their growth in virtue, we are dedicated to the complete formation of our students, remembering that in the end, only one thing is necessary.

As part of Laudato Si, (Encyclical of Pope Francis) students are learning to take care of our common home in STEM science class, which is definitely hands on and in the soil. If you walk around the back of the middle school, you will see the seven raised bed garden projects in cooperation with the MSU Extension 4-H and nutrition program. In early spring, students start plants from seed in their classroom. They watch the miracle of life unfold from those tiny seeds. Just before the last day of school they scramble to get the plants in the soil between the very tricky spring weather patterns of warmth and frostnot an easy task.

All summer families volunteer to water and weed. When they volunteer, they also get to eat the peas, beans, squash, dill, basil, parsley, and other tasty rewards. Sometimes there is even a bunny nest or two that must be moved to the lilacs. Marigold don't always

repel a determined rabbit. They also learn about Japanese beetles and the natural insect repellent of geraniums tucked among the vegetables.

When students return to school, they are amazed that the spindly tomato plants are now huge and loaded with red and yellow tomatoes, perfect for a recess snack. Zucchinis are a foot long and ready for banana - chocolate bread. Early in the school year, students will dig up potatoes and prepare a feast of parsley buttered red-skinned potatoes. If you explore more, you will find vellow raspberries.

On the building's west side, hundreds of flowers and shrubs in the Five Glorious Mysteries Garden and special drought-tolerant Girl Scout Garden were chosen and planted by the students to pop up under the snow in spring. Each one has a virtuous Medieval meaning like hydrangea--

gratitude, Black Eyed Susan encouragement, hope, motivation, innocence, and purity.

Now as you read this, students have been assigned 18 inches of the flower beds and are learning the difference between a flower and a weed with technology applications. Given 15 minutes, they will pull out the weeds and apply a special mulch. Before the snow falls, they will gather seeds and pile maple leaves around plants to protect the roots all winter until the cycle begins again. They will have earned a rest on the Guy Consolmagno/Petry benches and the Curran gazebo.

Interesting fact. Brother Guy Consolmagno is the Vatican Director of Astronomy and first cleric to receive the Cal Sagan Award. He has Marquette family and helped donate the prayer benches in the FMCA gardens in honor of his deceased family.
