The Religion Bee is similar to any quiz bowl event but based on knowledge of the Catholic faith! To participate, the students had to take a preliminary test to qualify for one of the teams. Father Marquette had two 5th/6th grade teams and one 7th/8th grade team. After making it onto a team, the students were given study materials consisting of over 200 questions and answers, specific study topics such as the virtues and events of the life of Christ, and studied maps of

St. Paul's missionary journeys. Each week leading up to the event we gathered once a week to cover different study topics with the help of Fr. Matthew Chartier.

The day of the Religion Bee, the students were excited and nervous. We gathered at Holy Name Catholic High School in Escanaba and the competition began. It was clear the other teams were well prepared based on the number of questions answered correctly but Father Marquette stood their ground. The event started with a group competition where each team was asked a question and if answered correctly, earned a point.
